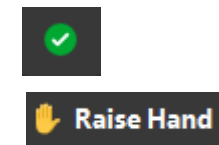
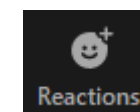
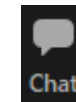

 - We raised \$6,310 this year, bringing our 5-year total contributions to nearly \$25K!!!

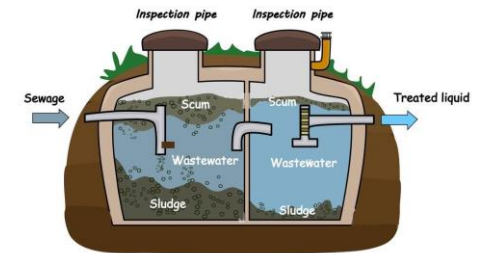

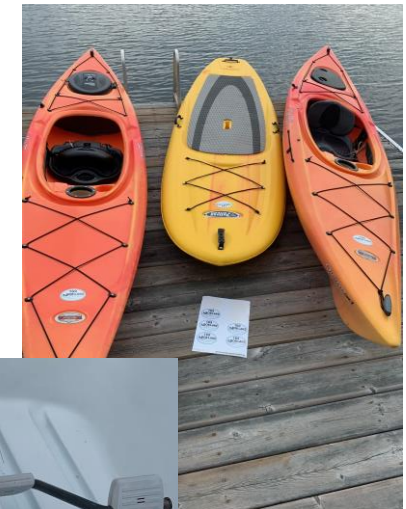

Chair's Annual Report (continued)

- Membership levels – OK but needs to grow
 - Active membership level is typically ~50% of the 230 properties (currently only 44%!)
 - We'd like to target 80%!
 - Higher membership means a bigger voice for our concerns
 - Ask your cottage neighbours & friends to join – ***help sell the BLA***
 - The \$40 annual fee (never increased) is not likely the deterrent
 - Expand option for members to pay BLA annual fees as part of their road association dues
 - Single annual payment for road + lake association fees with opt-out option

4. Wildfire Prevention

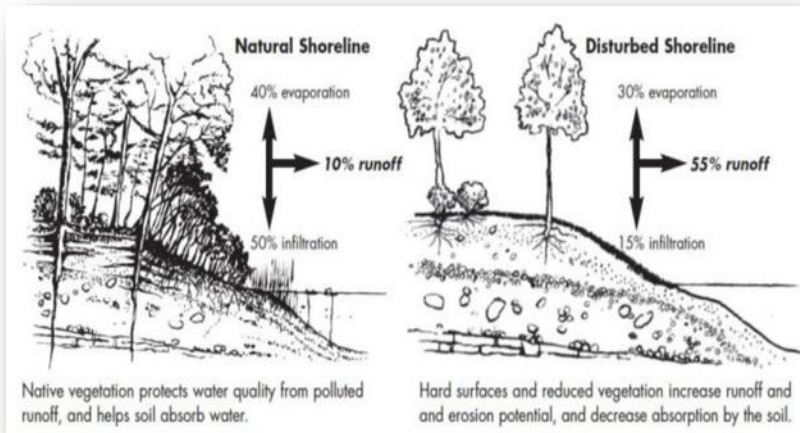

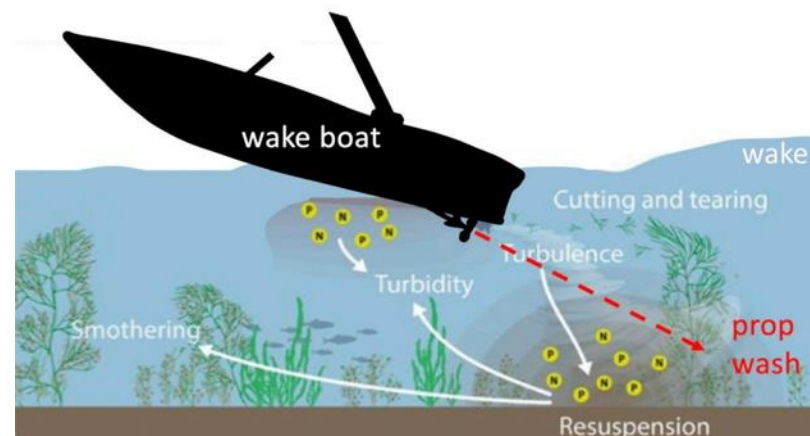

RENTING YOUR COTTAGE?

Protect Your Investment And Your Lake.

HERE ARE 3 SIMPLE SUGGESTIONS:

1. Ensure that you do not have an overcapacity crowd in your cottage
Capacity = # of bedrooms x 2
FOR EXAMPLE: A 3 bedroom cottage should not have more than 6 overnight occupants.

IF YOU HAVE MORE PEOPLE THAN THAT:

- RAW SEWAGE enters your tile bed and the water table
- you have to REPLACE your tile bed COSTING thousands of dollars and your lake becomes POLLUTED.

2. Post the C.H.A. Rental Posters in the Kitchen, Washroom, Laundry Room and Garbage Areas

Help your guests who may not be used to lake life and septic systems with practical tips:



3. Let your renters know that you are part of a lake community

Many people come to the lake for the peace and tranquility – ask them, kindly, that they respect this fact – particularly after dark.

FACT: Efficient Septic Systems Pollute Less → What Your Septic System Needs: Time & Bacteria

In order for GOOD Bacteria to work: Don't let 'bacteria killers' down the drain. They kill the good bacteria in your system. Don't let these 'bacteria killers' down the drain:



Write GOOD Bacteria!

- Chlorine Bleach & products containing chlorine
- Anti-Bacterial Soaps & Products
- Dishwasher Detergent containing chlorine (most brands do!)
- Dishwasher Rinse Aids (Tip: use lemon juice instead)
- Cream Cleaners – most have chlorine (see a.)
- Drain Cleaners
- Automatic Toilet Bowl Cleaners
- Liquid fabric softeners

DID YOU KNOW... It only takes ONE load of dishes using a regular detergent to kill ALL the good bacteria in your system for up to 4 days!

- Use Septic Friendly Products (look for packages saying: no chlorine & no phosphates)
- Never use a garburator

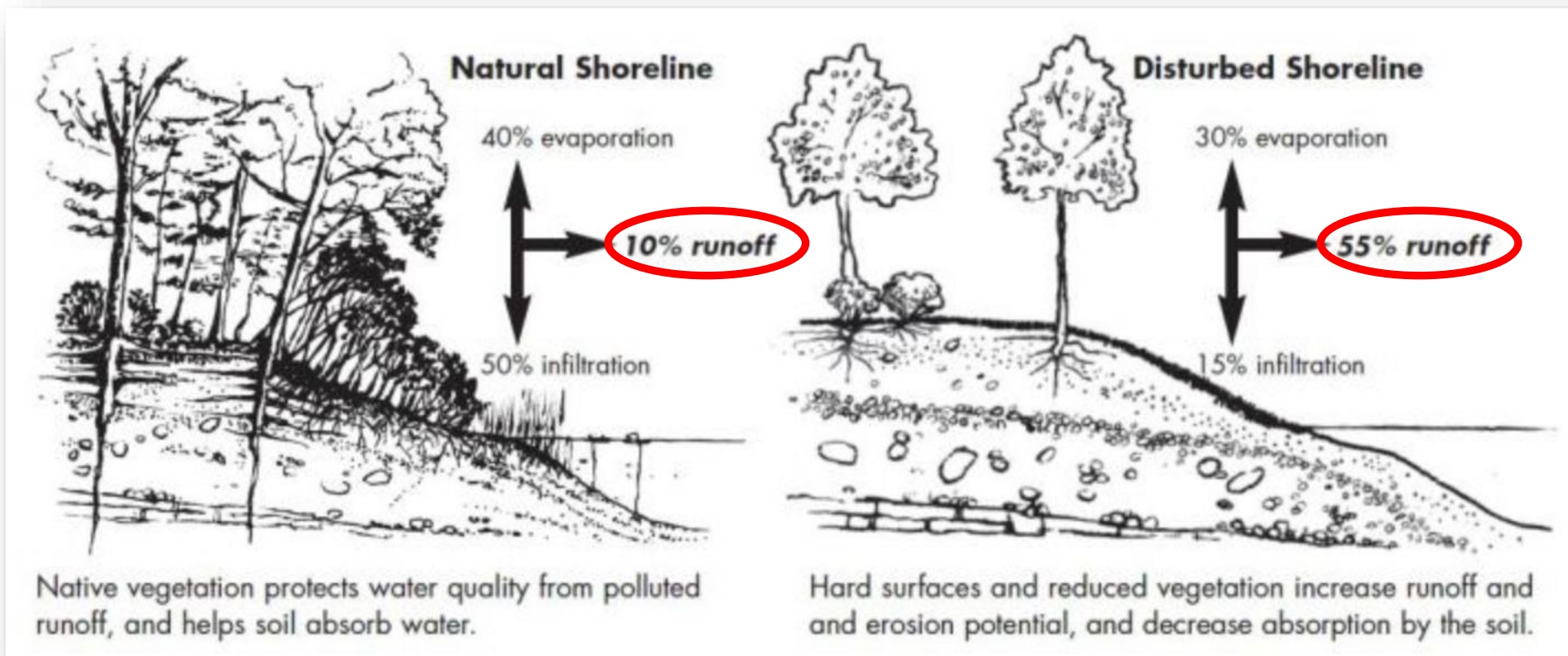

Priority – Natural Shorelines

Natural Shorelines Are Critical in Minimizing Runoff



Actions for You to Take

1. Eliminate:
 1. Fertilizer Use
 2. All Chemical Cleaners
 3. Salt Use
2. Must Do:
 1. Get your septic inspected and working optimally
3. Reduce/Minimize:
 1. Water Use – 1 load of laundry is the max in a day
 2. Soap Use
 3. Cottage Occupancy (never more than your septic is equipped for)
 4. Size of your boat's wake especially near the shore
4. Increase:
 1. Bacterial Cultures in your septic – EcoEthic
 2. Knowledge of all cottage visitors – Septic Tips
 3. Native plants (plant 5 plants per year)

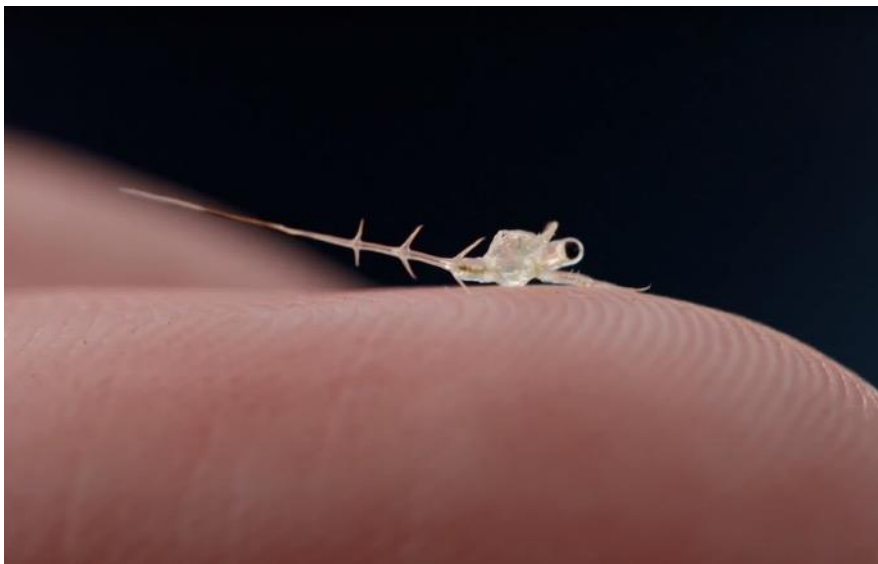
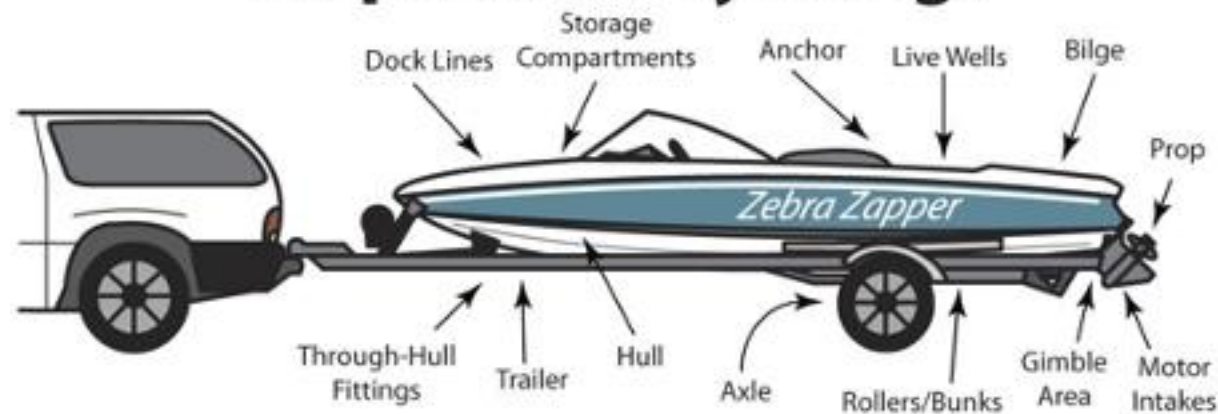

Spiny Water Flea – Detected in Bob Lake for the first time in 2024

- **Predatory Zooplankton:** It preys on native zooplankton, disrupting food webs by outcompeting native species and reducing the food available for juvenile fish.
- **Rapid Reproduction:** Spiny water fleas can reproduce both sexually and asexually, allowing them to quickly establish large populations.
- **Difficult to Control:** Their barbed tail spine makes them unpalatable to many native fish, and they can hitchhike on fishing gear, making spread prevention very challenging.
- **Ecosystem Impact:** Their presence has been linked to declines in native zooplankton populations, which can lead to reduced water quality and altered nutrient cycles in lakes.

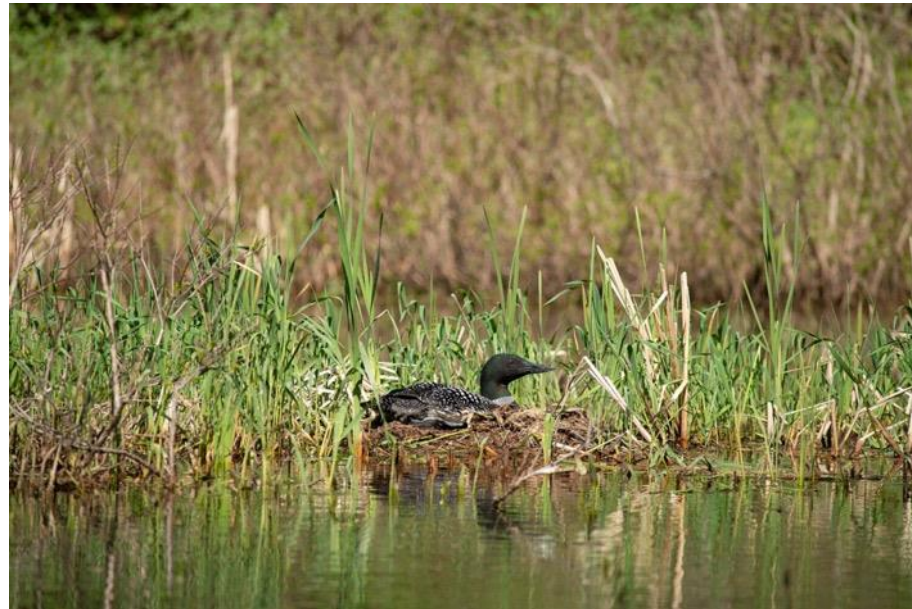
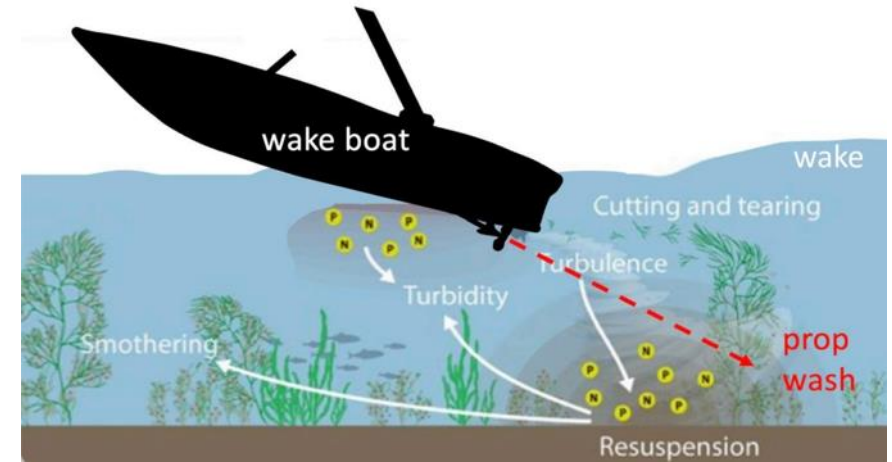


What can be done about invasive species

- There are no known controls for Spiny Water Flea
- Other invasive species can only be managed by costly, labour intensive manual control measures
- Prevention is the best course of action

Loon Protection

Threats to Loons in Nature

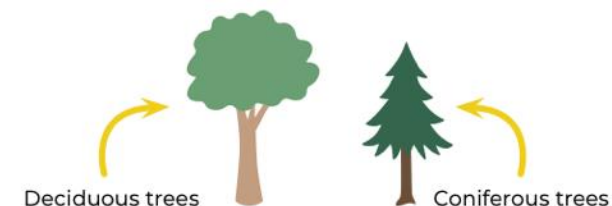
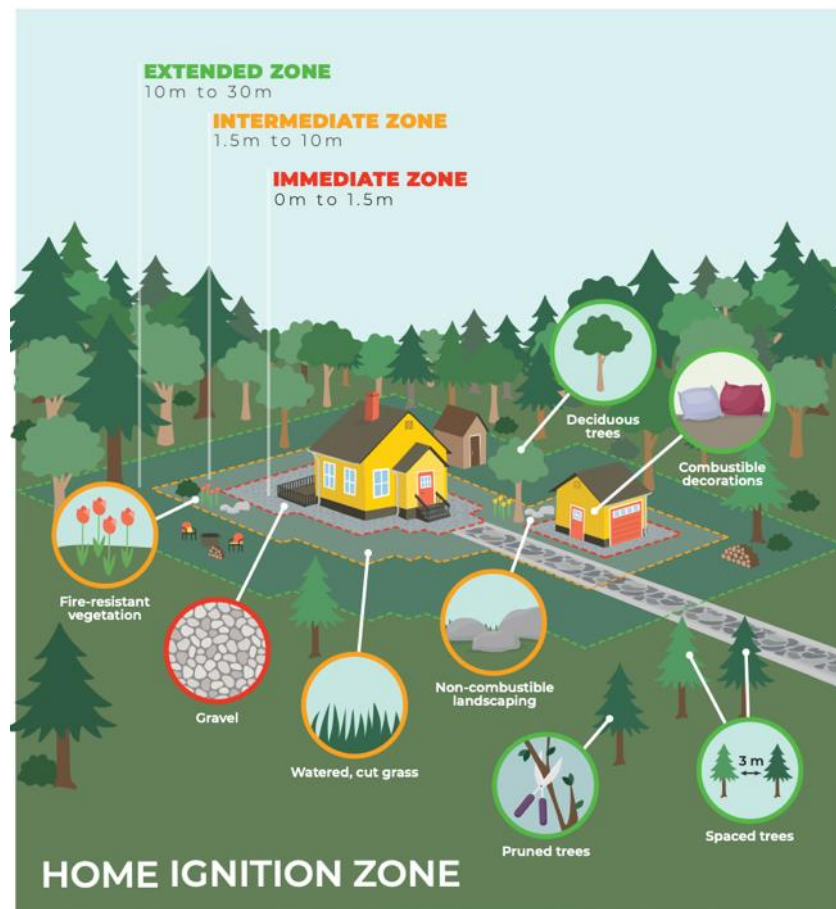
- **Nest Disturbance:** Loons nest at the water's edge, often on small islands or shorelines. Their nests are easily flooded or abandoned if disturbed by wakes, noise, or curious onlookers.
- **Boat Traffic & Wakes:** High-speed boats and large wakes can wash away nests or separate chicks from parents.
- **Fishing Gear:** Discarded fishing line can entangle and kill loons.
- **Lead Tackle:** Small lead sinkers and jigs are fatal if ingested by loons.
- **Habitat Loss:** Shoreline development and vegetation clearing reduce safe nesting areas.



• How You Can Help Protect Loons

1. Keep Your Distance
 - Stay at least **150 metres** away from loons, especially near nests or chicks.
 - Use binoculars to watch—never approach loons by boat or paddleboard.
2. Slow Down Near Shorelines & Islands
 - Reduce your wake and obey speed limits, especially during nesting season.
 - Avoid nesting zones marked with buoys or signs.
3. Use Non-Lead Tackles
 - Switch to **non-toxic alternatives** like steel, tin, or bismuth sinkers and jigs.
 - Collect and safely dispose of old tackle and fishing line.
4. Protect Shoreline Habitat
 - Maintain **natural shoreline vegetation** to provide privacy and shelter for loons.
 - Avoid clearing or altering known nesting areas
5. Educate Others
 - Talk to your family, guests, and renters about loon safety.
 - Encourage respectful wildlife viewing and responsible boating.

Fire Smart Guidelines – Please Pickup a Tip Sheet

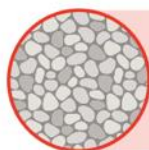


Easy win:

Swap out flammable mulch, such as bark and straw mulch, for non-flammable materials. Dry mulch ignites and burns much faster than damp mulch. Decorative rock doesn't burn.

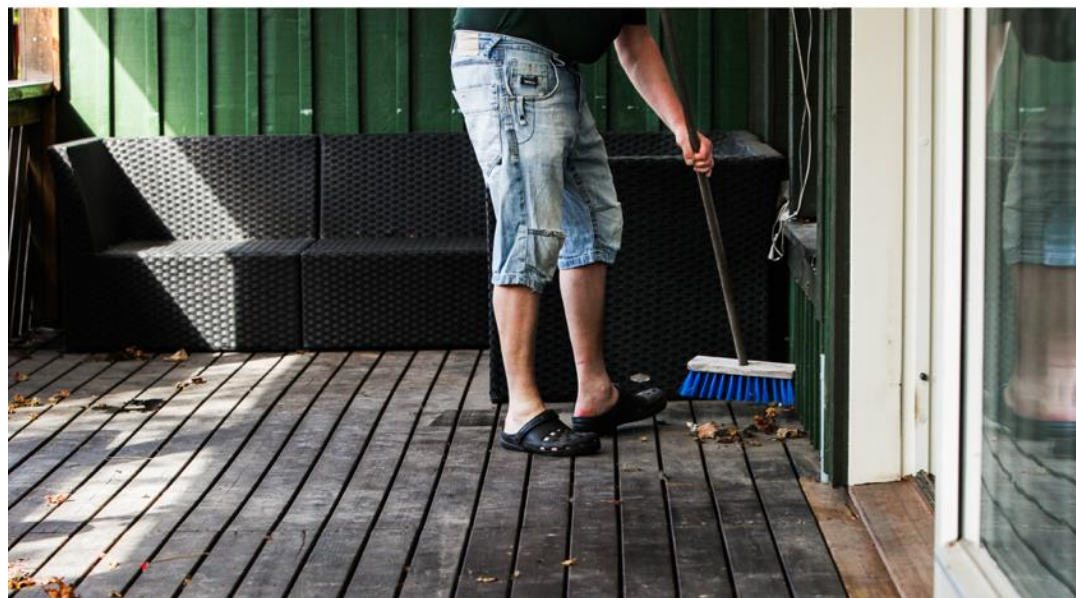


FireSmart Landscaping



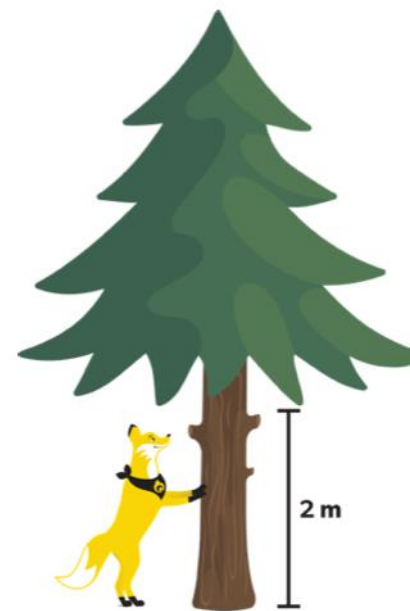
Easy win:

Ideally, a home is surrounded by 1.5 metres of gravel, concrete, decorative rock, or brick. If you have plant pots/boxes within this area, move them to the **Intermediate Zone**.



Pruning all trees within 30 metres of your home is recommended. If possible, prune all trees within 100 metres of your home.

Flowering trees, such as chokecherry or magnolia, may require more specific timing to ensure healthy bloom in the spring and summer. Other plants, including hedges, bushes and vines can also be pruned to keep them manageable and healthy, promote air circulation and remove dead and dry material.



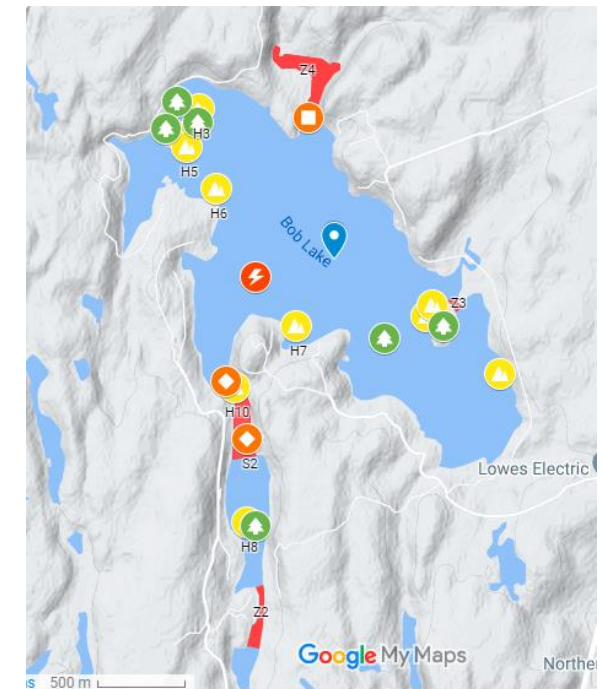

- How did we get here?
 - 9 years of working with the Township to restore our public boat launch to no avail
 - See BobLakeAssociation.ca/boat-launch for the full history (Plans A/B/A2/A3/C & more)
- Enter Plan L
 - Why **L**? Symbolic for **L**egal, **L**awyers, or **L**ast Hope 😊
 - The BLA has engaged a lawyer for a legal opinion of our options
 - Meet Jamie Cockburn, B.E.S. (Hons.), J.D, from SVLaw in Guelph Ontario
 - Jamie's assessment is that the launch land is considered a Forced/Trespass Road (public highway over private land) and its closure to the public is considered unlawful under the Ontario Municipal Act
- Special Zoom information session
 - Held on December 2, 2025
 - Approximately 70 attendees



Plan L - Fully In Motion

- Our court application has been officially submitted!
 - 9 sworn affidavits + 49 statements
 - Many other supporting documents
 - Big thank you to everyone for their statements!
 - Initial court appearance scheduled for October 19 via Zoom
- Funding
 - Approximately \$20K raised so far
 - Huge thank you for everyone who has donated!!
 - Could need another \$10-20K

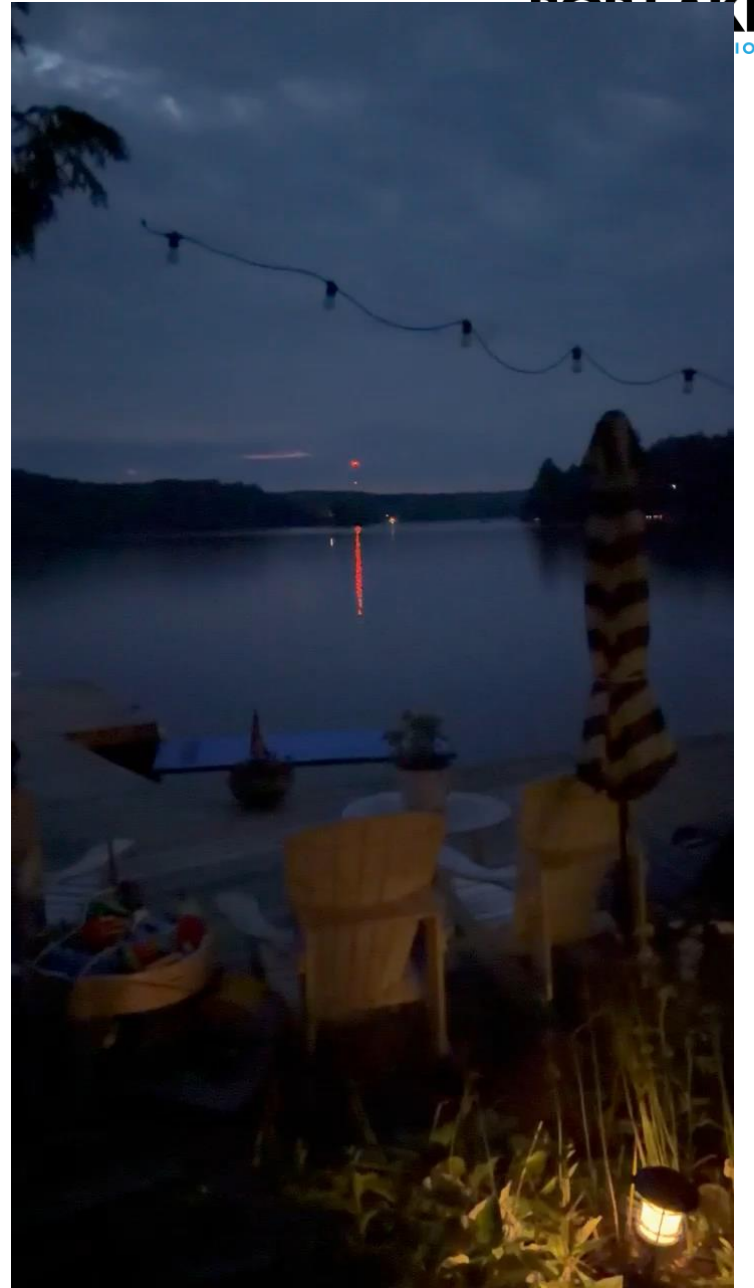
“Fight the Light!” – The Rogers Cell Tower

- Background
 - Announced in 2024 as part of the Eastern Regional Ontario Network (EORN) project awarded to Rogers
 - Rogers published article in Highlander (2024-03-28), BLA website post & email sent March/April of 2024
 - Construction completed this spring
- Impact
 - Highly disturbing red flashing nighttime warning light exacerbated by the reflection off the lake
- Potential Solutions
 - Aircraft Detection System (ADS)
- Approach Ideas
 - Delegation to Township requesting them to approach Rogers
 - Transport Canada assessment
 - Official request to Rogers directly
 - Property owner surveys / petition-like statements
- Step #1 - Establish “Cell Tower” Committee
 - Research
 - Documentation
 - Gameplan creation + execution
